**Outline syllabus:** The aim of the module is to introduce the key questions, theories, methodology, studies and research findings within developmental psychology,

Whilst the course will explore development across the whole life span, there will be a more detailed focus on development in infancy and childhood. The module will have a practical focus, exploring how theory and research in developmental psychology can be used to improve the lives of children and their families and inform practice in education, health and social care settings.

# Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

**Teaching and learning methods:** In this 15 credit module, scheduled learning includes lectures and seminars. The lectures will be given by staff with expertise in the area, supplemented by invited lectures from external subject specialists (where possible). These may be delivered either in-class or via a virtual learning environment. In seminars students will be encouraged to discuss and explore the main content from the lectures.

The intention of the course is that students will engage with course materials, learn actively, and generate their own areas of interest for further work. Students will be expected to attend timetabled sessions designed to guide their understanding of the topic material. They are also expected to engage in independent learning in which they read the essential materials and prepare for their assessments.

The module will use videos, pdfs, and self-directed on-line learning to establish basic knowledge and understanding. Feedback will be provided on a continuous basis throughout the module at the group level and on individual assignments where appropriate. Students will be enabled to use Blackboard, the university supported virtual learning environment to organise and communicate their learning material. Students will be able to engage with the material, other students and members of staff through this system and make use of the various functionalities built into the Blackboard (e.g., blogs, journals, audio, video, discussion boards, wikis, etc.).

### Part 4: Assessment

**Assessment strategy:** The assessment has been designed to ensure that student's have a breadth of understanding concerning theory and practice in developmental psychology. This breadth is the focus of the coursework portfolio (Component A). The portfolio will assess the students' breadth of knowledge through activities such as prep sheets, in which students will be asked to engage in reading and provide brief responses throughout the module. Activities such as a written assessment will assess their depth of understanding and critical evaluation skills.

Level 6 studies should also be seen as problem solving and at the forefront of academic debate; it is therefore the intention of this module to engage students in

This applied element of learning is the focus of the final exam (Component B): a final exam with online 24 hour submission. Answers are expected to draw on current and previous research literature in order to critically evaluate the subject matter presented.

In addition to these summative assessments, students will be given an the opportunity to complete a formative assessment, such as a short verbal presentation on their work. Full details for these assessments (including their respective weightings), will be laid out clearly in the module handbook; it should be noted that the details of the assessments may change from year to year within the specified framework.
