Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: Scheduled learning includes workshops, lectures, discussion, group and individual supervision sessions.

Independent learning includes hours for study with essential reading, use of online resources, assignment preparation and completion. Students are encouraged to sign up for relevant study skills sessions with the Library.

Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: The assessment will be a 6000 word dissertation in the form of a literature review. Students will select a topic relevant to contemporary social work practice. Students will be given formative support through submission of a dissertation proposal and allocation of a dissertation supervisor to work on an individual and small group basis with them. This will provide opportunities for feedback and support from the academic team and the peer group. There will

additional support sessions provided by the library to enable students to continue to develop their skills in data base search strategies.
