Students will typically attend 5 days (each day 6 hours) over the course of the module. These days will comprise a mixed model of lecture and seminar formats.
Scheduled learning includes lectures and seminars. Independent learning includes hours engaged with essential reading, case study preparation, assignment preparation and completion. TEL: The module will be supported by a Blackboard module site where a range of course materials will be available. Students will be expected to access reading materials through the Blackboard site, and engage with additional activities such as accessing video and weblinks. Discussion boards will be enabled for student use, facilitated by the module leader.

Reading Strategy

All students will be encouraged to make full use of the print and electronic resources available to them through membership of the University. These include a range of electronic journals and a wide variety of resources available through web sites and information gateways. The University library's web pages provide access to subject relevant resources and services, and to the library catalogue. Many resources can be accessed remotely.

Any essential reading will be indicated clearly, along with the method for accessing it. This guidance will be available either in the module handbook, via the module information on Blackboard or through any other vehicle deemed appropriate by the module leader.

If further reading is expected, this will be indicated clearly. If specific texts are listed, a clear indication will be given regarding how to access them and, if appropriate students will be given guidance on how to identify relevant sources for themselves e.g. through use of bibliographical databases.
