### Part 2: Description

This course aims to introduce students to the philosophical developments and theories of the 17th and 18th centuries in Great Britain and continental Europe, which provide the historical and conceptual background to current philosophical debates. We shall look at central figures in the empiricist and rationalist traditions, from Descartes to Kant. Topics may include: the attempt to provide a conceptual foundation for the mechanical natural philosophy of Boyle and Newton; Leibniz's *Monadology*; Spinoza's *Ethics*; the concept of substance; the nature of the mind; the nature and extent of human knowledge; and whether reality is independent of, or dependent on, the mind.

Teaching will be via lectures, seminars, and/or combined lecture/seminar sessions, with additional online learning resources.

Lectures are used to introduce key philosophical thinkers and texts and the problems they address. Seminars are used to examine texts closely, discuss the arguments they contain, and consider their wider philosophical significance. Students may be expected to prepare a presentation on an agreed topic and so actively contribute to the teaching and learning process.

#### Part 3: Assessment

The assessment for the module will consist in a 15 minute oral exam (40%) as well as a portfolio (60%).

An example of the portfolio would be: 2000 word Essay (80% of portfolio component), and a participation based element, such as submitting a comment or question on the reading on an online discussion board or preparing content for seminar discussion (20%). As portfolio content includes elements that involve ongoing participation in seminars the resit run of the module replaces the portfolio with a 2500 word essay.
