### Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: This module is assessed by two written submissions.

1. Advice to Client Assessment (40 % of module mark)

Written assignment - 1500 words based on preparation of a practical written advice to a client.

This element will assess a student's ability to apply knowledge to solve problems and in relation to a given topic; produce a synthesis of relevant issues, evaluate and analyse those issues and communicate effectively in writing.

2. Written Essay Assessment: (60% of the module mark) 2500 word coursework.

The assessment is designed to enable students to demonstrate their academic skills. The written assignment will normally involve the examination of legal issues raised by the development in the use of information technology. In particular this assessment will assess a students' skills in research, synthesis, evaluation and analysis.
