#### Part 2: Description

#### Educational Aims: See Learning Outcomes

**Outline Syllabus:** The module explores the different ways in which realism in cinema is understood. While documentary has been thought of as the primary site for the representation of actual events, a number of movements and stylistic trends have tried to achieve the same results in fiction films. Both documentary and fiction have claimed over the years to faithfully represent reality. The module introduces different documentary practices and approaches in fiction films that problematise the assumption of a direct and objective recording of reality (for example performative documentary, Cinema Verité, first person documentary, Neorealism or Free Cinema) and suggests some of the ways in which the representation of reality is constructed through a negotiation between the filmmaker, the camera and the audience perception and understanding of the image.

#### Part 3: Assessment

The assessments are designed to test students' understanding of the relation between reality, the camera that records it and our interpretation of the image and how that relation has been played out in both documentary and fiction film. Component B comprises the programme's introduction to close reading of critical/theoretical texts. Component A is part of the programme's strategy for developing essay-writing skills, building on the short structured answers from Component B and developed more intensively in the second semester module UPGN9C-15-1 Spectacle, Action, Narrative.

Component A: Online Examination (24 hour take-home exam). Students will answer questions about different conceptions of realism in fiction and documentary filmmaking.

Component B, Element 1: Comprehension exercise (1500 words). Students will answer short questions on brief critical extracts so as to demonstrate their understanding of key terms and ideas about the representation of reality in the cinema.
