#### Part 2: Description

This module explores ways of perceiving and experiencing cinema that are not generally included in conventional accounts that treat cinema as a narrative form providing almost exclusively a visual and cognitive experience. It reflects critically on a number of key concepts (such as embodiment, affect, and haptic communication) and philosophical approaches (such as phenomenology) in order to think in new ways about both mainstream and alternative film forms of film. This module studies some of the filmic practices that foreground a more varied sensuous encounter between film and viewer (for example cinema du look, cinema du corps, and horror). It will critically evaluate the usefulness of such encounters for an alternative appreciation of film in general, and consider some of the ways in which new technologies, such as virtual reality or 3D, asks audience to perceive film differently.

## Part 3: Assessment

The assessments are designed to test students' understanding of various approaches to spectatorship, including innovative contemporary theorisations (e.g., the 'affective' turn, the new film phenomenology) and their ability to describe and analyse embodied and affective cinematic experiences. Both assessment further develop students' critical, theoretical and writing skills, including their capacity for self-reflection, in relation to advanced contemporary film theory.

**COMPONENT A, Element 1:** Examination (2 hours) Students will answer questions about key theoretical ideas.

COMPONENT B, Element 1: Essay (2000 words). Students will critical engage with embodied and affective aspects of film spectatorship.
