Part 2: Description

This module explores how language and creative writing both shape our humanity, individually and collectively, through everyday communication, and construction, in fiction, of what it means to be human within humanity.

In TB1, students will learn about the evolution of language, and its significance in human development and society. Students will analyse language in everyday communication, building an understanding of how language can be used creatively and appropriately, according to the situation or desired outcome.

In TB2, students will work with set texts to consider issues such as how fiction can utilise and intervene in history; how fiction can explore who counts as human, the conceptual nature of humanity, and physical humanity, from the body to sexuality; and the power of language. As students progress through the set texts, the module considers further issues such as how fiction can represent and utilise contemporary society; our physical, digital, political, and societal identities; time; and the role of fiction in affecting change. Through study of themes such as these in lectures and seminar discussions, students will explore a range of techniques and issues in their own creative writing, which may include: point-of-view; genre; constructing identity and character; and writing about the past and present. We will ask, how can creative writing define and defend the meaning of humanity?

Learning methods include lectures, practical workshops and seminars for specific exercises and discussions.
