Part 2: Description

The aim of this module is to support students to undertake a major project that demonstrates consolidation of their own music practice and critical awareness of the field, as well as showcasing their talent. The work is presented either as a portfolio or as a performance supported by an in-depth piece of written work that contextualises, analyses and evaluates the final artefact. This also acts as a synoptic essay enabling students to reflect on their progress over the three years of the degree.

The module also aims to promote the development of advanced transferable skills that will be useful in a wide range of careers, by:

- building students' critical thinking and writing skills, to stretch their intellectual horizons and enhance a range of aural, information and written literacies
- equipping students with skills in independent research, time management, project management and presentation that will help make them more employable
- encouraging professional standards for the presentation of research material and developing a thorough knowledge and understanding of the chosen topic and a critical awareness of the relationship of student's own research to other work in the field.

In consultation with their allocated supervisor, students agree a suitable project that enables them to demonstrate a high level of music, research, analytical and presentational skills. Students are able to pursue research and practice into any area of music, which could include, but is not limited to, working towards a public performance, a portfolio of compositions, a research project in music theory, analysis or musicology. The negotiations regarding the suitability and content of a student's proposed project and individual plan of work takes place in the early stages of the module. This process also enables tutors to identify specific skills requirements across the range of projects and arrange additional seminars and workshops where necessary. Some teaching sessions may fall outside core university working hours. Regular individual tutorials are set up with specialist tutors to monitor progress and offer formative assessment, advice and support. Seminars and small group tutorials may be used to allow students to present work in progress to their tutors and peers. This activity enables students both to test their ideas on an audience and to continue to develop their skills in critical analysis and communication; it also supports continuing cohort interaction and debate.

Areas of relevance to all students are covered through lectures. For example, briefing lectures support students' understanding of the assessment requirement while other sessions supported by UWE Library Service and UWE Study Skills cover research methodologies and study skills, how to develop a research question, identify appropriate academic sources, how to avoid plagiarism, draw on wider reading and structure an argument as well as essay writing techniques.

Part 3: Assessment

Assessment Strategy

The assessment types have been chosen to enable students to demonstrate the production of substantial music work and their development of a range of transferable skills. Clear expectations regarding academic probity, advice about what constitutes plagiarism and advice about correct referencing will be supplied in the Module Handbook. Assessment Criteria as related to the module learning outcomes will be detailed in the Module Handbook.

Formative assessment

Students will receive regular formative feedback through small-group and individual tutorial sessions. There will also be opportunities to present their work to other students in order to gain feedback from peers. All students will be expected to contribute to the critical evaluation of fellow students' work. In terms of the written requirement, students will be required to submit an essay plan and bibliography mid-way through the module for formative assessment. Although tutors will provide advice and comment on draft work together with recommendations for reading, the responsibility for the essay and bibliography lies with the student.

Summative assessment

Component A1: Portfolio Component A2: Presentation

Full guidance as to the requirements will be available in the Module Handbook. For example,

- The Portfolio may consist of an artefact (such as, a concept album, portfolio of compositions, or in the case of a performance, a video recording) supported by a 4,000 word commentary that will contextualise, analyse, and evaluate the artistic work as well as reflect on their learning during the course of the degree OR a 12,000 word music research project. Students are required to show clear evidence of a wide range of reading and research and a critical approach to their studies.
- The Presentation will be in the form of a 15' Viva voce examination, that is, a discussion of issues arising from the artefact and supporting commentary.
