Part 2: Description

This module is designed to help students understand the expectations of study in higher education and to introduce them to the academic and study skills required for success on their chosen subject pathway. The module focuses on the core underpinning skills necessary for the thematic modules and aims to develop capacity and confidence for effective independent learning and academic progression. It also has the aim of building up confidence in each student via weekly group and collaborative activities.

Content will be shaped indicatively on the following areas:

- Writing for different purposes
- Using appropriate academic conventions and style, referencing and avoiding plagiarism
- Reading strategies for different purposes
- Summarising, interpreting, analysing and evaluating information from a range of sources
- Target setting, planning and time management for independent learning
- Reflecting on learning and progress in response to group discussion, formal and informal feedback
- Oral presentation skills
- Note-making skills for reading and lectures
- Exam skills
- Using IT for academic purposes
- Teamwork skills and group collaboration
- Identifying, locating and retrieving information from a range of sources

Part 3: Assessment

The assessment strategy is designed to support and enhance the development of core subject specific skills and transferrable study skills. Assessment is through coursework and a presentation tailored to complement learning on the other modules in the foundation year and support effective progression to undergraduate level.

Component B (75%) contains 3 elements:

Reflective journal (1,500 words)

The reflective journal will allow students to reflect on the process of researching, planning and completing academic work, building their skills to eventually equip them for degree level study. Students will be required to make regular entries through the year which reflect on activities, responses to learning and the university environment, barriers and solutions to problems, learning from feedback and progress. Some entries will be completed, or drafted, in class allowing the tutor to offer formative feedback and support gradual student development.

Essay exercise (1,000 words)

Students are instructed, and assisted, during contact hours to develop an essay plan and identify suitable research materials - before writing up and submitting their work in a structured format. This makes for a structured progression from organising and planning work, to producing a short essay – suitable to embed skills at the foundational level.

Literature review exercise (1,000 words).

This assignment is designed to develop students' ability to employ academic reading, reasoning, research and written skills to review a source and to reflect on the obstacles faced when engaging with academic literature.

Component A (25%)

Presentation

This assessment requires students to engage in collaborative evidence-based learning and to research and present on a topic relevant to their chosen pathway degree scheme. Students will present for approximately 5 minutes each, and will be assessed based on their individual contributions.
