Part 2: Description

This module is designed to help students understand the expectations of study in higher education and to introduce them to the academic and study skills required for success on their chosen pathway. This module allows students to experience ways of working, and better understand the ways in which individual disciplines in the arts and humanities intersect and diverge. Students will work with tutors across the Department on short, self-contained projects which offer the opportunity to experience varied approaches to research, the development and delivery of a project, and core disciplinary knowledge fundamental to each of the subject clusters within the Department.

All projects will use the city of Bristol as a starting point and/or subject to enable students to develop a wide range of skills which will deepen their understanding of subject-specific knowledge in relation to local contexts, both past and present.

Part 3: Assessment

Both Component A and B help to develop students' wider understanding of the Programme and enable them to make informed decisions about future pathways.

Component A

This in-class presentation tests students' critical, analytical, reflective, project management and editing skills. It also builds on the formative opportunities students will have to present their ideas throughout the module. Students will deliver a 5mins presentation, demonstrating effective use of relevant presentation platforms and presentation skills.

Component B

This Portfolio allows students to develop a range of ideas and skills. The individual elements within the Portfolio will reflect the students' engagement with different aspects of arts and humanities disciplines and will assess their understanding of core skills including their ability to produce work to deadlines, respond to project briefs, work independently, work as part of a team, research and edit materials, produce clear, coherent, and rational arguments and communicate these to an audience through a range of media.
