Syllabus Outline	Syllabus outline:				
	In this module, students will work with professional theatre directors and within a production team to produce film trailers.				

	Students will engage with a range of BOVTS theatre productions in rehearsal to produce the trailers and they will be involved throughout the production process, from initial concept, filming chosen extracts from rehearsals and other appropriate content, through to post-production and distribution. Students will be introduced to the facilities at Christchurch Studios and will also participate in a range of specialist masterclasses and workshops appropriate to the project and their area of specialism (directing, editing, producing, camera, sound). Students will also be expected to critically evaluate other professionally produced theatre trailers as part of their development.
Contact Hours	The MA in Film Production is delivered as a fulltime programme. Students are expected to be in attendance for a minimum of 35 hours per week for the 38 weeks of the course. Students' will work in the production office, on location and in the edit suites.
Teaching and Learning Methods	Scheduled learning includes individual tutorials, group workshops and masterclasses, as well as supervised time in the theatre and production studios. There will also be practical workshops where instruction will be given on shooting, editing and the working at Christchurch Studios. Students will be expected to undertake a range of production roles as well as begin to develop their own specialisms.
	Independent learning includes hours engaged with rehearsing, scheduling, filming and completion of the assessment.
Reading Strategy	Essential reading: any essential reading will be indicated clearly by the tutor. The specifically vocational nature of training and study, combined with the project based nature of learning on the course, may require that students are guided to reading and research material in the first instance by the module leader. In addition, students will be expected to undertake further reading and viewing depending on their specialism.
