# Part 2: Description

Educational Aims: See Learning Outcomes.

**Outline Syllabus:** The module covers four main thematic blocks in the study of European Union politics:

- 1. Theorising and conceptualising the broad framework for understanding the EU's internal and external relations introduction to the contending approaches used to understand and explain the key patterns of the EU's political activity and its organisational engagement along geographical and functional lines.
- 2. Key institutions and processes that enable the European Union to be an actor and to be active in a range of policy sectors analysis of core areas of Europeanization and the extent to which the political settings and policies of the member states have converged around distinct European positions and procedures, including an analysis of the instruments that allow for the continuation of European integration, and their assessment in terms of accountability and legitimacy, consistency and coherence as well as efficiency and effectiveness.
- 3. An examination of the strengths and weaknesses of substantive EU policies pursued in the internal and external arena recognising historical preconditions for intra– and interregional cooperation with special reference to the European Political Economy, the Single Market, Justice

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and Home Affairs, the Common Foreign and Security Policy, and EU Treaty reform.

4. Critical reflection on the normative assumptions related to Europe's internal and external challenges – focused discussion of the work of authors who have linked the various aspects of the module with a civilian power image, the development of a coherent strategy and particular policy programmes such as Economic and Monetary Union and the Eastern Partnership.

## Part 3: Assessment

The assessment has two components: a short presentation and a written position paper, both of which are factors in a simulation game.

The position paper (component B) requires a student to take on the role of an actor in the EU Council of Ministers and to write a position paper in response to a given Council negotiation. It will provide students with an opportunity to further develop their skills in advancing a clear and persuasive argument. Students will be encouraged to deploy critical analysis in order to develop and support the argument. In addition students will be able to enhance their research skills, independent study, and a skill of clearly articulating and communicating complex ideas in writing and within a set word limit.

The position paper provides a resource for the oral presentation of a country position during the simulation game (component A - to be uploaded via Blackboard). Students will be encouraged to deploy a focused analysis in order to develop and support a particular objective during negotiations. In addition, students will be able to enhance their research skills, independent study, and a skill of clearly articulating and effectively communicating complex ideas orally within a set time limit.
