Part 2: Description

The module provides an excellent platform for students willing to expand their knowledge and understanding of historical and well as political relationships in Southeast Asia. The module also critically engages in some of the most current international relations debates over the region, for example the continued development of the Association of South East Asian Nations as an international actor, the plethora of security challenges (both traditional and non-traditional), the rise of China and democratisation of Myanmar.

The module adopts a country focused approach, and focuses on the range of challenges that have emerged in the Southeast Asian region, the ways in which they have been resolved, and significant the reasons why some have not been rectified.

This module explores and analyses how Southeast Asia has developed, both in terms of individual member states and as a regional player in the form of ASEAN. It will also explore the role that external actors have had in facilitating and hindering these developments.

Part 3: Assessment

The assessment has two components. Written position papers to be developed and delivered orally as part of a crisis simulation game, and a 2000 word essay.

The position paper requires the student to role play a regional actor, and through negotiation, develop and deliver responses to an unfolding crisis within a 3 hour simulation scenario. This will provide students with the opportunity to develop their skills in advancing clear and persuasive arguments orally, negotiation, and team work, as well as responding to their peers, within a controlled environment. Students are assessed individually for their

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participation.

The essay will enable students to demonstrate that they have achieved the learning outcomes as well as show how they have utilised research skills, independent study, and the ability to clearly articulate and communicate complex ideas in writing.
