Part 2: Description
<p>The aim of the module is to consider the complex issues faced by social workers in contemporary society working with adults at risk. Students will be supported to critically examine contemporary legislation and policy considering the impact on individuals, communities and organisations. Complex issues relating to power and authority and the impact of measures including austerity on notions of health and well being and user participation will be explored and critically debated. Students will be encouraged to explore and challenge dominant discourses in respect of contested areas of practice such as human rights and end of life decisions.</p> <p>Key themes of diversity and inequality will underpin all teaching and students will be challenged to apply contemporary research and theory to social work practice with specific service user groups including older adults and disabled people. The module will explore notions of adulthood and transitions considering the changing views of participation, rights and choice across the lifecourse.</p>
Part 3: Assessment
<p>Summative assessment for this module contains two components:</p> <p>Component A – an oral presentation of up to 30 minutes, including time for critical questions. Students will be asked to select a particular service user group and consider how social work practice can be used to address issues relating to race, culture, gender or sexuality impact on them. They will critically examine the legal and policy frameworks that underpin practice and draw on relevant research and theory.</p> <p>Component B – a 4000 word assignment based upon a single case study exploring contemporary issues relating to right to life and end of life decisions. Students will draw on a range of learning from within the module to critically explore issues including, rights and participation,, austerity and legal frameworks. They will also provide an effective critique of relevant discourses relating to age, disability and mental health.</p> <p>Formative feedback opportunities are provided to students throughout the module by the teaching staff and through</p>

peer led learning sets. Students will be asked to read and discuss specific journal articles related to diverse communities and service improvement models. They will thus gain feedback on their developing understanding, knowledge and critical evaluation skills within a supportive context. Teaching staff will provide ongoing feedback on the appropriateness and level of student understanding and skills

Apply a sophisticated understanding of service user rights and participation to current social work practice. (Component B)4. Evaluate and critique the impact of austerity measures on social work practice and service provision. (Component B)5. Critically debate complex issues of rights in respect of key issues such as right to life and end of life care. (Component B)6. Critically discuss issues of race, culture, gender and sexuality within specific population groups including older adults and disabled people.
