Part 2: Description

In this module you will examine a range of different genres that are typical of nineteenth and twentieth-century American literature: short-stories, novels, poetry and drama.

You will consider each genre in terms of its distinct formal qualities and the context from which it emerges. The relationship between form and context will be an important theme of the module.

Your exploration of these American literary genres will also enable you to understand and critique the representation of race, gender, class, ethnicity, and other social and political concepts, such as freedom.

In this module, you will cover texts from the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. An indicative list of authors includes Edgar Allan Poe, Nathaniel Hawthorne, Emily Dickinson, Walt Whitman, Kate Chopin, F. Scott Fitzgerald, Robert Frost, Zora Neale Hurston and LeRoi Jones.

The module will be taught across 12 weeks using 2 hour lectures and 1 hour seminars.

Part 3: Assessment: Strategy and Details

There is one assessment point, a final written assignment of 2500 words to be submitted in the January assessment period (outcome 5).

The written assignment will be comparative, asking you to work across different genres (outcomes 1 and 4).

It will also require you to choose an appropriate critical methodology (outcome 2), and to locate the texts in their contexts (outcome 3).

The unique comparative and methodological approaches this will demand, along with the design of the questions, will help to avoid plagiarism.

Lecture and seminar time across the module will be devoted to helping you to prepare for the assessment.
