## Part 2: Description

This module will introduce you to a diverse range of texts which engage with contemporary debates about class and different aspects of culture during a period of profound social change. You will study some major novels and poems which typically focus on the problematic relationship between rich and poor, discourses on class difference, the importance of a new urban environment for different classes, and the rise of aestheticism and decadence.

Fiction from different genres within the period will be considered, such as the Newgate novel and social-problem fiction. Poetic genres studied may include the ballad and dramatic monologue. The texts will be studied in relation to contextual issues such as industrialisation and urbanisation, social change and the Crisis of Faith. Issues of publication, readership and reception will also be explored as appropriate.

There are three hours of contact time per week, used flexibly to include lectures, seminars and workshops as appropriate. Lectures may include audio and visual materials. Seminars and workshops involve the close analysis of primary texts, the application of critical approaches, the

discussion of contextual material and oral presentations as appropriate. Teaching takes place in rooms designed for interactive activities including group work.

## Part 3: Assessment: Strategy and Details

The assessment enables you to achieve the learning outcomes of the module as detailed in Part 4 of this form. It also contributes to the learning outcomes of the programme in that it allows you to develop your understanding of an area of English literature in its historical and cultural contexts. It develops your appreciation of literary genres, your ability to research, synthesise and engage with secondary literature, and to communicate your ideas effectively.

The assessment consists of a 2500-word essay will test your ability to select and synthesise relevant core reading from the module in relation to a chosen topic. You will select primary texts by several writers and construct a sustained argument in response to the question. You will be expected to engage meaningfully with relevant further reading. You will combine close analysis with an understanding of genre, context and criticism as appropriate.

You will be advised on good writing and referencing practice in preparation for the essay.
