Part 2: Description

In this module students devise and produce a research project that investigates an identified topic and its relationship to themes and critical discourses in animation and other media. The topic can relate to a specialised creative interest, and can address themes and issues related to their project work. The extended essay can take the form of a written essay or an audiovisual essay; for both options students must provide substantial evidence of research activity and wider reading in the form of a bibliography (written essay) or in the credits and captions (audiovisual essay).

Indicative content:

- Ways to generate ideas for an extended essay.
- Being a practitioner-researcher: identifying the connections between topics, theory and their practice.
- Critical theory in support of research questions and investigation.
- Research models, methods and strategies in support of investigation and analysis.
- Historical and contemporary contexts of production, exhibition and reception.

Lectures and seminars will enable students to generate and question ideas, think discursively and utilize research methods. Students will have an allocated academic supervisor for this project and supervision meetings will support students as they formulate their research question, conduct research, structure their argument and produce their essay.

Poster presentations (formative assessment) will enable students to synthesise and focus their research question and investigation in relation to critical theory, written and filmic references and other forms of evidence. A first draft outline (formative assessment) will enable students to structure and evaluate their investigation.

The module handbook will give detailed guidance in relation to written and audiovisual assignments, academic probity and plagiarism. Additional study workshops in support of academic writing and research methods can be booked through the UWE Library Services website. Individual support for writing assignments is available from UWE Study Support.

Part 3: Assessment

Assessment Strategy

The Final Project assessment enables the student to demonstrate achievement across all the learning outcomes of the module. This assessment type has been chosen as most appropriate to the programme's summative piece of academic analysis, critique and writing as well as to enable flexibility of presentation formats. The learning outcomes for this module reflect independent engagement with research activities and critical theory in support of a substantial research project. Evidence of enquiry, initiative, analysis and the articulation of findings will be the core focus of assessment. Formative and summative assessments are designed to provide the opportunity for students to understand and reflect upon their achievements and to support the monitoring of progress by the student and their academic supervisor.

Formative Assessment

Participation in formative assessment activities such as poster presentations and group tutorials involving peer-topeer discussion is incorporated into this module's delivery. Further formative assessment will take the form of a first draft outline (or edit in the case of audiovisual outputs); this will enable students to structure and evaluate their investigation and to gain specialist feedback.

Summative Assessment

Component A1: Final Project (100%)

Students produce a research project in a form most appropriate to communicating their ideas and argument (for example, a written essay, illustrated written essay, a film essay, an audio essay, which is supported by references and a bibliography using the UWE Harvard Referencing System.

Assessment Criteria (as related to learning outcomes)

Students will be assessed using the following criteria:

- Research and creative development (LO1, LO2, LO3, LO4): The use and breadth of research methods, discursive thinking and discussion in support of enquiry and investigation; The ability to connect academic research to identified interests, topics or themes;
- Contextual and critical analysis (LO1, LO2, LO3, LO4, LO5, LO6): Intellectual enquiry and critical engagement with the subject, its wider context, critical theory, debates, themes and ethical considerations; The ability to focus, edit and deepen enquiry and evidence this in formative and summative assessments;
- **Communication and engagement** (LO1, LO3, LO5, LO6): The ability to mediate, structure and communicate research findings in presentations, written or audiovisual outputs;
- Professional practice (LO1, LO2, LO6): Engagement with project work and the supervision support
 system; Time-management and organization of the research process; Independence, initiative and
 resourcefulness; The construction of well-designed and coherently articulated work that features
 correct spelling, grammar, accurate citations, referencing and captioning.
