Teaching and learning methods: This module has 200 allocated hours. Forty-eight

hours will be scheduled learning and 152 independent learning.

A variety of learning approaches will be used.

Scheduled learning will include face-to-face lectures, seminars, tutorials, group work,

and workshops.

Independent learning requires students have access to a computer and the Internet

for the duration of the module. These hours are for essential reading, preparation for

group work, and assignment preparation and completion.

There are 48 face to face contact hours; these are over 6 timetabled days.
