Section 2: Programme Overview, Aims and Learning Outcomes

Part A: Programme Overview, Aims and Learning Outcomes

Overview: The FdSc Nursing Associate Programme has been developed to provide

an outcome based programme of academic and practice -based learning that will

develop the wide-ranging skills and capabilities required to support the role of the

registered nurse.

The programme will meet the required professional standards as stated within the Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC) Standards of proficiency for nursing associates (2018). Students will be supported in accordance with Part 2: Standards for student supervision and assessment (NMC 2018) and the programme has been guided by and mapped against the Nursing Midwifery Council (NMC) standards of proficiency for nursing associates (2018).

The programme is aimed at those individuals wanting to work in health and social care, beyond the level of a healthcare support worker, enabling them to have opportunities to progress and develop their careers. They will work under the leadership and direction of registered nurses providing and monitoring high quality holistic and person-centered care to individuals whilst supporting the registered nurse in the assessment, planning, implementation and evaluation of care.

The programme is a collaborative development with clinical partners in meeting both local and national demands of the health care workforce to meet patients' needs and expectations now and in the future; with employability and enterprise skills development integral to the programme. Through working in partnership with our local National Health Service partners, and private and voluntary sector partners, the student will be able to experience the range of health and social care that will prepare them for their role. On successful completion of the programme nursing associates can be employed across a variety of health and social care settings without being confined to one geographical area.

On completion of the programme the student will be eligible to apply for registration with the Nursing and Midwifery Council (2018) as a Nursing Associate. Progression can either be onto the BSc (Hons) Health and Social Care to top up to a Degree, or to progress in Nursing on to the UWE BSc (Hons) pre-registration nursing programme at an advanced entry point.

Educational Aims: The programme has six platforms and 2 annexes with associated learning outcomes that are achieved through both theory and practice experience by the student.

Six platforms:

- 1. Being an accountable professional
- 2. Promoting health and preventing ill health
- 3. Provide and monitor care
- 4. Working in teams
- 5. Improving safety and quality of care
- 6. Contributing to integrated care

Programme Learning Outcomes:

On successful completion of this programme graduates will achieve the following learning outcomes.

Knowledge and Understanding

- A1. Demonstrate underpinning knowledge and skills required for their role in supporting people to improve and maintain their individual mental, physical, behavioural health and wellbeing. The student will actively be involved in the prevention of and protection against disease and ill health, and engage in public health, community development, and in the reduction of health inequalities (NMC 2018).
- A2. Have underpinning knowledge and skills required to understand and apply their role to work effectively as a member of the interdisciplinary team, collaborating and communicating effectively with nurses, a range of other health and care professionals and lay carers. (NMC 2018).

Subject/Professional Practice Skills
