PART A: PROGRAMME OVERVIEW, AIMS and LEARNING OUTCOMES

1. (Programme) Overview (c. 400 words)

As a Paramedic Science graduate, you will have a detailed knowledge of all aspects of pre-hospital emergency care including both urgent and critical care and be able to demonstrate the skills and attitudes necessary to provide effective and holistic care. You will have an awareness of the impact of psychological, sociological, anatomical and physiological factors affecting the acutely sick or injured service user. You will be able to apply clinical reasoning and problem-solving skills relating to these factors and apply them to your knowledge in practice. In addition, you will be able to demonstrate teamwork in multi-professional working and be able to apply evidence-based practice interventions.

The programme emphasizes the importance of interpersonal skills to calm and reassure the service user and their relatives at a time of crisis and high anxiety. The programme features a strong emphasis on simulation activity and you will participate in a wide variety of simulation activities including; a multi-professional simulated major incident exercise where you will showcase your ability to apply risk assessments in the unpredictable context of pre-hospital emergency care, trauma related simulation including road traffic collision extrication and mental health related scenarios amongst others.

During your three years you will be given the opportunity to experience multiple placement opportunities including front line emergency ambulance work, acute hospital operating theatre, central delivery suite and paediatric acute and urgent care.

As a graduate of this programme, you will have become a reflective practitioner with an ability to evaluate your own provision of emergency and urgent care and that of others. You will have excellent communication skills and considerable knowledge of alternative care pathways for the management of non-time critical patients and the challenges which arise from these cases. As a paramedic graduate you will understand and adhere to the professional codes of conduct for your chosen profession.

On completion of the Paramedic programme you will be able to demonstrate personal leadership and practice education skills and work well as part of a team. You will have shown that you hold patient care in prioritisation of workload including knowledge of health protection and prevention which you will study with students from other Allied Health Profession. At the point of qualification, you will be armed with the knowledge, skills and professional standards required to register with the Health and Care Professions Council and practice as a paramedic. This programme is aligned to the The Institute for Apprenticeships & Technical Education - Paramedic Degree Standard (2019, 2018, 2017) and prepares you, the apprentice, to meet the knowledge, skills and behaviours of the Paramedic Degree Apprenticeship Standard, ensuring that you graduate from this programme, pass the end point assessment and are fit to meet the future needs of employers and service users.

PART C: HIGHER EDUCATION ACHIEVEMENT RECORD (HEAR) SYNOPSIS

Graduate paramedic apprentices will apply the professional framework of practice, which promotes equality and respects the rights and beliefs of others. They will reflexively evaluate the effectiveness of their practice, apply research and clinical audit. In practice, paramedic apprentices will have opportunity to apply their learning within Ambulance Trusts and within multiple acute and urgent care settings. Here they will build an understanding of emergency and urgent care including physical and mental wellbeing and how to manage each case within the relevant legislation, social policies, and ethical frameworks. Paramedic graduates will be enabled to practice as an HCPC registered paramedic.

Using the above guidance and standards, the programme has been designed to accommodate the apprenticeship model of delivery, allowing for learning to occur mainly in practice with minimal need for extraction from front line services. Pedagogic and assessment strategies have been developed with the need to reduce the impact on the apprentice in order that assignments can be submitted online, through online exams, written assignments and projects and by using technological communication platforms. Although some pedagogical design must include classroom based teaching and assessment, such as paramedic specific skills at all three levels (4, 5 and 6) due to the invasive and high risk nature of these skills, apprentices will be assessed both formatively and summatively by Practice Placement Educators as well as academic staff accordingly.

In order to overcome the constraints of the work-integrated learning nature of the apprenticeship model, support for Practice Placement Educators (PE) and apprentices will be rigorous and in the form of frequent tripartite meetings between the learner, PE and academic staff. Regular PE update/support training will be provided in collaboration with our partner organisations to ensure parity of assessment and current evidence-based practice is adhered to.
