## **Section 2: Programme Overview, Aims and Learning Outcomes**

### **Part A: Programme Overview, Aims and Learning Outcomes**

**Overview:** The MSc in Project Management programme will provide graduates with the relevant knowledge and understanding and experience of applying practical skills in project management, which will equip them to succeed as project managers. Whilst students will specialise in project management, the characteristics of the course will also provide a focus on the interdisciplinary nature of the subject and how project management is integrated within organisations and how latest methodologies are applied in practice.

The MSc Project Management is aimed at students who wish to develop knowledge, understanding and intellectual and practical skills in project management within industry and the business environment in a global market place. It is designed to be accessible to students from any discipline or degree background, unlike other project management courses, whether they are from a business, arts or technical background. Students will have the opportunity to build on prior learning and experience and to specialise in a discipline with a growing professional demand across various sectors.

Examples areas where project management roles are increasing are the public sector, utilities, business services (such as engineering, infrastructure, regeneration, banking, retail, law firms), events management, charitable organisations, plus many more.

Successful students will develop competence in using a variety of tools and techniques required to lead and manage projects successfully, and will be able to tailor them appropriately depending on the type of project/organisation, as well as across geographical boundaries. Students will understand the strategic value of project management to businesses and will graduate with a skill set that will enable them to be senior project managers, or researchers, and have the relevant soft skills to work with and manage a wide variety of stakeholders. In addition to utilising tools and methodologies, students will develop a range of transferable soft skills that are imperative to the successful management of projects including delivering oral presentations, communication, leadership, problem solving, strategic thinking, and research skills, all skills highlighted by employers as being essential, and thus of great value when seeking future employment.

**Features of the programme:** The programme displays currency in terms of content (knowledge, understanding and skills) and follows the latest global project management methodologies and frameworks.

In addition to equipping students with the fundamental understanding of the theory of project management, it will equip students with the necessary personal, technical and practical skills to enable them to effectively manage projects in complex and global environments.

All assessments have been designed to be inclusive and authentic in approach to prepare students to step into project management careers. There are consequently no exams, but instead practical assessments, that combine theory and practice.

Students will be supported through their programme leader along with experts from professional and technical services.

The programme prepares the student for immediate and active employment in a project-based environment.

**Educational Aims:** To provide a coherent programme of advanced postgraduate study in project management, which is firmly underpinned by a wide range of research (including that carried out by staff who teach on the programme) and by Faculty scholarship, consultancy, and links with practice;

To enable students' to develop systematic and creative solutions to a range of complex project management issues across a range of organisations including public, private and not for profit sectors;

To enable students to understand current developments and challenges in the field of project management within an international context;

To encourage students to develop the capacity for advanced thought and action that is independent, critical, reflective and applicable in a range of global contexts;

To foster in students a commitment to personal development and enhance students' transferable and professional skills towards improving project management career prospects and lifelong learning;

**Assessment strategy:** The assessment strategy takes into account the different needs of each individual module on the programme. The assessment strategy therefore employs a range of assessment methods, such as individual coursework (reports, presentations and reflective essays), group work (reports, presentations,

and case studies), and a final applied project with a written deliverable of about 8,000 -10,000 words.

All assessments for the programme have been designed to be practice oriented and therefore, inherently graduate attribute enabling. They have been designed with inclusivity in mind, with no examinations.

In preparing for these assessments, students will be able to undertake a series of formative exercises and gain feedback in response. Expectation concerning the assessments will be discussed in class, and students will also be able to present plans of their assessments for formative review.
