Section 2: Programme Overview, Aims and Learning Outcomes

Part A: Programme Overview, Aims and Learning Outcomes

Overview: The LLM in Global Business and Finance Law allows students to develop their knowledge and understanding of the laws and regulatory structures underpinning business and finance in a globalised economy.

Students choosing this LLM will be engaged in the study and critical evaluation of a range of current issues, including the changing technological landscape, legal and regulatory responses to financial crime and the role of corporations in developing and maintaining ethical and sustainable business practices.

The LLM in Global Business and Finance Law operates within an educational environment where students will be encouraged to grow personally and professionally. Students completing this LLM will also possess a range of intellectual and professional skills, allowing them to pursue diverse employment opportunities such as legal practice, public sector employment, banking and financial crime investigation and regulation.

As a HE institution, FTU's mission is to serve the society with excellence in education, knowledge creation and transfer. Its vision is to be a leading innovative university, through its core values which include, innovation and excellence, accountability and resilience, diversity and inclusion. Features of the programme: The Global Business and Finance LLM engages with innovative learning and teaching strategies, research-led and practice informed teaching with the opportunity for students to develop their critical understanding of the law while engaging with some of the most pressing global issues impacting the world of global business and trade. Students will develop their own analytical skills needed to make reasoned, creative and original judgments regarding the development and practical application of the law in this area. The programme provides students with the core legal knowledge and systematic understanding of the fundamental legal principles and the requisite skills in preparation for employment in legal practice, public sector employment, banking and financial crime investigation

and regulation.

The programme is designed to enable students to continuously work towards the graduate attributes defined by UWE's 2030 Strategy and FTU's mission and core values.

Educational Aims: The LLM in Global Business and Finance Law aims to facilitate the following:

A systematic and structured knowledge of regulation of international commercial transactions, banking, and the tools and techniques that support advanced legal research.

An ability to critically evaluate law and policy in this field and to apply relevant laws and theories in order to solve complex problems and consider solutions for reform/improvement.

An ability to communicate professionally, make effective decisions in a variety of situations, and manage complex tasks independently.

An awareness of themselves as global citizens through the recognition of the importance of ethics, sustainability and diversity in a global context.

A commitment to lifelong learning and personal professional development.

Assessment strategy: The programme adopts a programmatic assessment strategy which is built on inclusive authentic assessments. The strategy considers the different demographics of our students, together with the competencies, knowledge, and attributes they will gain upon completion of their studies with us. The strategy provides for formative assessments which will enable students to make use of feedback to develop their learning and skills.

In addition, the strategy considers the high rise of assessment offences through contract cheating and plagiarism or the recycling of essays. Therefore, a range of assessment styles are adopted with the aim of deterring assessment offences as well as meeting the aims of the programme learning outcomes whilst reflecting the learning in the modules.

Throughout our modules, students will have a single point of assessment. We take a programmatic approach to the assessment strategy by creating an interaction in the different module assessments. The assessment styles and formats are varied and set with the aim of developing their knowledge, problem solving, research and reflection on learning and personal and professional development. By way of example, the assessment methods include presentations, course works but also

aspects of practice such as drafting of legal advice.

The variety and authenticity of our assessment styles will enable our students to develop their academic and professional skills, helping students prepare for their transition into professional life.

Student support: STUDENT SUPPORT AND GUIDANCE

Student support for all issues relating to the content, delivery and assessment of modules is provided by Module Leaders and for more general academic and professional concerns by the LLM Programme Leader. Moreover, at FTU students receive support from staff in both the Faculty of Law and Faculty of International Education. Students at FTU also have a class tutor that acts as a personal tutor and meets with the students on a monthly basis to discuss any issues that the students have.

All students are invited to participate in an Induction programme at the start of their studies. This includes specific guidance and orientation sessions. The LLM handbook also provides details of a range of issues relating to the LLM programme.

FTU has its own library which students have access to. In addition, FTU students have access to UWE's online library services, study skills workbooks and other materials. Further support is also available through CBAL's Learning Hub activities which take place online.

FTU has a Student Service Centre which also supports students. For instance, they organise an annual FTU Career Fair which provides students with opportunities obtain information, engage with employers, orient and choose career pathways that suit their needs.

Focussed on enriching student experience, FTU runs a range of internal competitions for its students and also encourages students to take part in external national, and international competitions. Students are guided and supported by staff

when taking part in such competitions. In addition, FTU regularly arranges events with a wide range of stakeholders with a view to transform awareness, build capacity, foster actionability and develop co-operation which students are invited to be a part of, and participate in.
