Part 2: Description

This postgraduate Law programme offers students an opportunity to engage with the challenges posed by the current international trade regime in a legal context. It takes the perspective that international trade and economic law need to be considered along with the social, political and economic dimensions of governance and development. A range of trade and related issues are explored, such as the impact of international trade policy and rules on sustainability, development, human rights, competition and dispute settlement from the viewpoint of both developed and developing countries. The programme supports key aims of UWE, in seeking to foster internationalisation and global citizenship. It is designed to encourage innovation and creativity in assessing current problems at the cutting edge of international trade and economic law and in designing responses thus preparing graduates for employment in legal practice and commercial organisations as well as the public sector and non-governmental organisations, both in the UK and abroad.

The programme is based on an understanding of law as both a vocational discipline and a subject of academic study. The programme seeks to reflect this by:

- Equipping students with an advanced understanding of international trade and economic law, especially focusing on current issues at the forefront of academic study.
- Developing the analytical skills needed to make reasoned, creative and original judgments regarding the development and practical application of the law in this area.
- Assisting students to develop greater intellectual autonomy and to become independent learners.
- Equipping students with the research skills and methodological knowledge needed to conduct advanced legal research.
- Refining students' ability to communicate effectively complex ideas in oral and written form.
- Developing students' ability to look reflectively at their own professional practice.
- Encouraging ethical decision-making, sustainability and global citizenship.
- Assisting students to develop the qualities and transferable skills necessary for employment requiring the exercise of initiative and personal responsibility and decision-making.
- Encouraging lifelong learning and personal development and thereby enabling students to be able to work with self-direction and originality and to make a positive contribution to society.

This programme equips students with an advanced understanding of key areas of law. It develops essential analytical, research and communication skills necessary for employment in legal practice as well as in related fields of employment.
