Section 2: Programme Overview, Aims and Learning Outcomes

Part A: Programme Overview, Aims and Learning Outcomes

Overview: The BA (Hons) Law and Criminology programme aims to provide a solid grounding in both disciplines through core modules, whilst allowing students to follow specific interests through the range of optional modules. This will include optional modules required by those wishing to pursue a professional law career or otherwise whilst still exploring various aspects of criminology.

At Level 4, students are provided a comprehensive introduction to the related disciplines of Law and Criminology. At Levels 5 and 6, the programme is designed to help students develop an in-depth and detailed understanding of both Law and Criminology to an advanced level, highlighting how these two disciplines interact in a holistic manner.

Features of the programme:

Educational Aims: The aim of this programme is to provide an innovative, collaborative and inclusive education in Law and Criminology. In doing this the programme will:

Facilitate the development of a systematic understanding of law and criminology within an institutional, social, local, national and global context.

Support the development of intellectual independence and self-directed research to provide students with skills for employment within legal and criminal justice sectors.

Equip students with the skills to be enterprise-focused, innovative and confident problem-solvers.

Enable the growth of a confident and open-minded approach and a willingness to engage in continuous learning and development.

Encourage an awareness and application of appropriate sustainable, ethical and practical principles.

Assessment strategy: The programme adopts a programmatic assessment strategy which is built on authentic assessments. The strategy considers the competencies, skills, knowledge, and behaviours students will gain upon completion of their studies. The strategy provides for formative assessments which will enable students to make use of feedback to develop their learning and skills. The Bristol Law School Graduate Attributes have also been considered and allow students to develop and be assessed on innovation, collaboration, and enterprise. Additionally, a

range of assessment styles are adopted with the aim of deterring assessment offences as well as meeting the aims of the programme learning outcomes whilst reflecting the learning in the modules.

We take a programmatic approach to the assessment strategy by creating an interaction in the different module assessments. The assessment styles and formats are varied and set with the aim of developing their knowledge, problem solving, research and reflection on learning and personal and professional development. By way of example, the assessment methods include presentation/oral based assessments, again, allowing students to demonstrate and develop their innovation, collaboration, and enterprising skills.

In addition, the strategy, considers the high rise of assessment offences through contract cheating and plagiarism and or recycling of essay. Therefore, a range of assessment styles are adopted with aim of deterring assessment offences as well as meet the aims of the programme learning outcomes whilst reflecting the learning in the modules

Student support: Support is available through the Peer Assisted Learning, Learning Hub, Careers, Library, Student Support Advisors, and a comprehensive range of support services which are offered by the university.

As a practice led law school, we offer a range of pro bono activities, and mooting through the Student Law Society. Other activities include skills competitions in the fields of negotiation, interviewing and mediation through a Legal Communication Skills Programme; volunteering activities with local organisations such as Bristol Law Centre and Age Cymru , all of which aim to support students in their personal and professional development and ,in the case of pro bono, in their understanding of the importance of civic responsibility.

Year 3

To be eligible for Placement, students would normally be expected to have passed a minimum of 210 credits.

Work Placement:

A significant period of paid employment or self-employment normally in the field relevant to the specialism of the degree.

During this time students must complete the 15 credit year 3 module, Placement Learning UMCDN5-15-3. This module assesses the student's personal development, from the experience of placement and their ability to identify issues relevant to their Placement's organisational context and to then frame, scale and position a critical work-based enquiry relevant to the specialism of the degree.

Study Year Abroad:

This consists of two semesters of study at a partner institution abroad. During this time students must complete the 15 credit year 3 module, Learning and Development on Study Year Abroad UMCD9Y-15-3. This modules assesses assess the student's personal development from the experience of SYA and their ability to evidence cross-cultural awareness and analysis of the country in which they have been studying.
