Part 2: Educational Aims of the Programme

This specialist programme within a conservatoire drama school aims to equip students with the advanced management and theatre production skills required to gain employment within a professional producing theatre environment. It is a niche area of postgraduate education and vocational training building on a student's previous training and or professional theatre experience at a management level in stage or technical theatre management. Through a specific theoretical project in constructing, scheduling and producing a report and presentation on a theatre tour the student develops analytic, budgetary and logistical skills required of a production manager. This then moves the student into the practical realization of theatre productions in a range of professional theatre venues in Bristol, taking increasing responsibility for managing the production process. In-house learning is further consolidated through a placement in a

professional theatre production department, providing the opportunity for the student to reflect on their own practice away from the drama school environment.

Overall aims of the programme:

- To develop a student's skills to an advanced level in leadership, creative problem-solving, and project management.
- To learn to take a high level of responsibility in the theatre industry and gain experience in a professional context.
- To develop professional contacts within the industry and career management skills

Programme requirements for the purposes of the Higher Education Achievement Record (HEAR)

Students with the career aim of employment in this senior managerial area acquire the advanced creative problem solving and management skills required of a professional theatre production manager. The learning environment reproduces the complex creative working environment of a theatre production department; students are immersed in this challenging environment which demands great attention to detail, independent thinking, collaborative working combined with diplomatic negotiating and leadership skills.

Part 4: Student Learning and Student Support

Teaching and learning strategies to enable learning outcomes to be achieved and demonstrated

Students work closely with the School's Head of Theatre Production and are integrated into the School's production cycle. The course moves from theoretical project and presentation, involving classes and supervised learning through to taking lead management responsibility on public productions. Through this production experience students acquire high level negotiating and problem solving skills not only within the School's learning environment but also through interaction with theatre professionals in Bristol theatre venues and on placement.

Assessment: Learning is assessed at the end of each theoretical/practical project work module.

Emphasis is placed on production roles undertaken and judged against professional industry standards. Feedback on the student's work is sought from the range of departments with which the student has been involved eg. scenic construction, design, etc. as well as the student's own self-critical evaluation of their performance.

Practical classes include CAD, working / union contracts, scheduling, H&S legislation.

Description of the teaching resources provided for students

Students are based at the Theatre School's Downside Rd site, in the theatre production office. Students interact with other production departments, in particular Design, Costume, Lighting, Sound, Scenic Construction and Scenic Art across the Theatre School's sites. Theatre production learning and experience takes place in professional theatre venues in Bristol and on placement in professional theatre organisations.

Description of any Distinctive Features

The programme is practical and career focused. It is integrated with the school's other programmes during productions, as well as within the professional environment, as some performances take place in local professional theatres. The programme features a high level of one-to-one teaching by specialist professionals and work is realised for professional standard performances. Finally, the students are assessed against professional standards.

The learning is immersive with students taught / supervised by teaching staff at least 35 hours per week across the 38 weeks of the programme. The learning is immersive and singular in its focus on high level specialist professional employability as a main learning outcome. There is a maximum of two students accepted to this course (although normally only one).

They should have a good command of the English language and some understanding of the skills required of, and the role of, a theatre production manager. They should also be able to produce evidence of at least some of the essential skills required to carry out theatre production management.

Applicants will be interviewed by two members of staff, including the Head of Theatre Production.
