- a systematic understanding of key aspects of their chosen field of study, including acquisition
 of coherent and detailed knowledge, at least some of which is at, or informed by, the
 forefront of defined aspects of the discipline
- an ability to deploy accurately established techniques of analysis and enquiry within a discipline
- conceptual understanding that enables the student:
 - to devise and sustain arguments, and/or to solve problems, using ideas and techniques, some of which are at the forefront of a discipline
 - to describe and comment upon particular aspects of current research, or equivalent advanced scholarship, in the discipline
- an appreciation of the uncertainty, ambiguity and limits of knowledge
- the ability to manage their own learning, and to make use of scholarly reviews and primary sources (for example, refereed research articles and/or original materials appropriate to the discipline).

Programme requirements for the purposes of the Higher Education Achievement Record (HEAR)

This award is conferred on students who have demonstrated the ability to achieve academic standards at Level 6 as required by the FHEQ (Framework of Higher Education Qualifications). This includes the systematic understanding of key aspects of a field of study, an ability to use established techniques of analysis and enquiry, an ability to sustain an argument and solve problems.

The award route provides opportunities for students to develop and demonstrate knowledge and understanding, qualities, skills and other attributes in the following areas:

Learning Outcomes:

A) Knowledge and understanding of:

how to apply the methods and techniques that they have learned to review, consolidate, extend and apply their knowledge and understanding, and to initiate and carry out projects

a complex body of knowledge, some of it at the current boundaries of an academic discipline. Through this, the student will have developed analytical techniques and problem-solving skills that can be applied in many types of employment. how to evaluate evidence, arguments and assumptions, to reach sound judgements

and to communicate them effectively.

The learning ability needed to undertake appropriate further training of a professional or equivalent nature.

Demonstrate the qualities needed for employment in situations requiring the exercise of personal responsibility, and decision making in complex and unpredictable circumstances.

Part 4: Student Learning and Student Support

Teaching and learning strategies to enable learning outcomes to be achieved and demonstrated

At UWE, Bristol there is a policy for a minimum average requirement of 12 hours/week contact time over the course of the full undergraduate programme. This contact time encompasses a range of face:face activities as described below. In addition a range of other learning activities will be embedded within the programme which, together with the contact time, will enable learning outcomes to be achieved and demonstrated.

In order to achieve this particular award the student will have undertaken teaching which is a mix of scheduled and independent learning.

Scheduled learning can include lectures, seminars, tutorials, project supervision, demonstration, practical classes and workshops; fieldwork; external visits; work based learning; supervised time in studio/workshop. Scheduled sessions may vary slightly depending on the module choices made.

Independent learning includes hours engaged with essential reading, case study preparation, assignment preparation and completion etc. Scheduled sessions may vary slightly depending on the module choices made.
